"Even though I was allowed to help out in grandpa's vines as a small child, I did not grow up with viticulture," says Jessica Himmelsbach. She only found her way back to viticulture at the age of 21 when she was working a grape harvest. From that moment on, there were no second thoughts: she decided to become a vintner. Right from the beginning, it was important for her to be involved in the industry beyond her profession, taking the future into her own hands and actively shaping it. She is involved in the Bund Badischer Landjugend (a rural youth organisation in Baden) both in the winegrowing working group and on the state board. Due to this commitment, some of her hobbies have had to take a back seat for now. In earlier years, the versatile woman from Heitersheim, who describes herself as very musical, played both the flute and the oboe as well as being an enthusiastic classic and Latin dancer.

As Regional Wine Queen of Baden, it was important to her to convey to people how much work and heart and soul go into a bottle of wine. Equally important to her are topics such as the conscious consumption of alcohol or sustainability in viticulture: "The cultivation of fungus-resistant grape varieties is hopefully not just a short-lived trend, but a forward-looking change." It fills her with pride that she has entered the industry and acquired her expertise with initiative and keen interest. Jessica's grandfather is one of her great role models. She appreciates him for his determination, resilience, diligence and warmth.

Thanks to various stays abroad, the 28-year-old speaks very good English and confident Dutch. Whether growing her own fruit and vegetables at home, hiking, cycling or inline skating, on her days off, she heads out into nature. In the future, this ambitious young woman envisages even more thrills - a paragliding flight, bungee jumping or a demanding, multi-day hike in the mountains.
